Therefore, the tense that we can use must be a bit more past than the tense that we will use to express the truth.

Second and Third Conditional Sentences - English Grammar Here

Type 1 conditional sentences are used to talk about real and possible situations. Here we use a simple present tense in the if-clause and will /can / may + infinitive in the result clause. Study the sentences given below. If I am hungry, I will get something to eat.

Type 1 conditional sentences - English Grammar

Prototypical conditional sentences in English are those of the form "If X, then Y". The clause X is referred to as the antecedent (or protasis), while the clause Y is called the consequent (or apodosis). A conditional is understood as expressing its consequent under the temporary hypothetical assumption of its antecedent.

The third conditional requires us to construct a sentence in two parts. We make the third conditional by using 'if,' the past perfect form of the verb in the first part of the sentence and then 'would have' and the past participle the second part of the sentence: if + past perfect, ...would + have + past

participle It talks about the past.

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
